

Camphor began in 1922 when Rev. William Casey, pastor of Calvary Methodist Episcopal Church (now

Tindley Temple) and his wife, Catherine, opened their home at 5832 Filbert Street to a small group of neighbors for Bible studies and class meetings, as there were no Methodist churches in the West Philadelphia area. The following year, the Board of Home Missions appropriated funds to establish six missions in West Philadelphia, including our small "Saint

Delaware Conference in 1923, the name of St. Matthew Mission was changed to Camphor Memorial Methodist Church in honor of Alexander Priestly Camphor, the 4th African-American to be consecrated a bishop by the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Camphor's first pastor was Rev. William E. Hilton and the first worship service was held December 9, 1923, in a leased "store front" at 5818 Vine Street.

The membership grew rapidly and in May 1924, Camphor purchased a lot at 58th & Haverford and soon thereafter built an edifice which would be-



come known as "Little Camphor." After the Depression, Camphor blossomed under the dynamic leadership of Rev. Marion Clark, Rev. Noah Moore and Rev. Daniel Rideout. The present sanctuary and buildings were acquired in January 1943. When Rev. Marion Ballard was appointed pastor in 1959, membership had swelled to 922.

In May, 1965, Camphor along with 20 other African-American churches in Pennsylvania that were part of the former Delaware Conference in the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, became charges of the Philadelphia Annual Conference. Since 1969, with the merger of The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, Camphor has been a premier church in the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church.

UMCOR responds to quake

NEW YORK — "This is going to be the one remembered as the earthquake that killed the children," said Marvin Parvez, a Methodist and the Pakistan/ Afghanistan director for Church World Service. Parvez has been on the scene in Pakistan helping coordinate the CWS response to the calamitous earthquake that, as of Oct. 14, had killed more than 25,000 people. He urged people to pray for parents who lost children and for children who lost their parents.

Women call attention to ethical issues

STAMFORD, Conn. — United Methodist Women is calling on its membership to address issues of race and class raised by Hurricane Katrina. The UMW issued a statement, "Be Repairers of the Breach," during the Oct. 7-10 annual meeting of the Women's Division, which is the UMW's administrative arm. UMW members are urged to study biblical and ethical obligations "to respond and address both immediate and long-term system injustices." In the community, that means having conversations on issues of race, class and public policy; serving as advocates for those displaced by Katrina; and leading dialogues "on what it means to … be communities of hospitality."

"I think it will be received well (at Camphor) if it is done well and tastefully," said Duglas, who is also a member of the senior choir.

"My expectations are that the people who come will learn something about movement, something about the history of dance in the church."

Second Samuel 6:14 says King David "danced be-

fore the Lord with all of his heart." Psalm 150 says we are to "Praise Him with the timbrel and dance." And, according to an online Maranatha Life article by Richard A. Murphy, "The New Testament church gained most of its style of worship from the



Jews. Since the Jewish believers were used to dance as a form of worship, they naturally taught it to the gentiles."

"Dance in the church has gone in and out of fashion or favor throughout history. The Reformation put a damper on dance in the church," explained Duglas. "But, it's making a comeback in modern times."

Duglas, a former dance teacher with Joan Myers' Philadanco, said she believes praise dancing at Camphor will imbue the church with an "additional spirit." "I would like our liturgical dance to illuminate the Word, and to be an addition to the Word that helps people get into the spirit and to understand. It will be just a plus."

Expect to see the new ministry during the Thanksgiving and Christmas worship services, and then in the New Year. Duglas said she would like to see praise dancing be a part of a service at least once a month. All are invited to participate in one of Camphor's newest ministries. We proudly salute **Mrs. Martha Brown Cobb** who has been a faithful and dedicated member of Camphor Memorial UMC for nearly 60 years.

Mrs. Cobb was born in Steelton, PA, on April 9, 1906. She came from a family of 12 chil-

dren and is the sole survivor of them. She received her early education at the historic Hygienic School of Steelton, established by the African-American community following the Civil War. In 1923 she graduated from Steelton High School. She is listed among "Steelton High School African-American Graduates" by the Afrolumens Project, a Central Pennsylvania African-American history project (www.afrolumens.org).

At age 15, she started her faith journey which occurred in Sunday School at the historic Monumental AME Church, founded by ex-slaves in Steelton. Mrs. Cobb continued her education at Shippensburg State Teachers College and returned to teach in the public schools of Steelton. She married Theodore Cobb in 1946 and moved to Philadelphia. As Philadelphia did not permit married women to teach, Mrs. Cobb entered Penn's School of Social Work and thereafter was employed as a Social Worker by the State until retirement. She joined the Camphor family in 1947 under the pastorate of Rev. Daniel Rideout and was a member of the Senior Choir for many years.

Mrs. Cobb is an amazing person. Her current ministries at Camphor are Stewardship and Bible Study. She participates in Bible Jeopardy games during fellowships at church and her knowledge of the Bible is extensive. She plays hymns and songs on the piano and doesn't use a cane or walker. She is always spirited, cheerful and encouraging. When asked for her fondest memories at Camphor, Mrs. Cobb quickly responds, "the Senior Choir, Bible Study Class and the fellowship with the people at church." We look forward to her 100th birthday in April. Mrs. Cobb, we are very proud of you!
