Worship Service - April 6, 2008

Rev. Laurie Ann Rookard, Senior Pastor, brought the Word on this Third Sunday of Easter and Communion Sunday from Luke 24:13-35 and

John 14:11-15, as read by **Rev. David Brown**, Deacon. The scripture was the familiar story, Road to Emmaus. Rev. Rookard began by informing that the sermon, "It Can Happen To You," would be in three parts: remembering the story, telling the story and living the story.

In Luke 24, Rev. Rookard describes how Cleopas and a friend have left Jerusalem after Jesus' crucifixion. They are despondent as they are walking the seven miles to Emmaus and talking about all that has happened. On the road, they are approached by Jesus who they do not recognize. When Jesus asks them what they are talking about, they related their high hopes that Jesus was going to set Israel free but now Jesus has been crucified and are puzzled that some

women have said that he is alive. Jesus criticizes them for not believing and then beginning with Moses and the prophets explains everything the scriptures state about him. When the group arrives in Emmaus and Jesus appears to travel on, the two friends implore him to stay with them. It is only at a meal when Jesus took the bread, gave thanks and broke it they they knew he was Jesus and he immediately disappeared. The two then asked, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" They then hurry back to Jerusalem and tell the Eleven Disciples that it is true that Jesus has risen.

Rev. Rookard instructed that we, too, must always remember the Easter story so that we can tell it to others. Secondly, we must tell and re-tell our faith story in the context of a loving God so that hearts will be warmed and lives transformed by the hope we give to others. Thirdly we must live the story that we tell by making choices to do the community.



Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s** life is commemorated not just because he lived and died but because of the choices he made to live his life. He knew Jesus, his heart burned, and he responded in love. BridgeWalk for Peace Commemorates Assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin L. King, Jr.



The first-ever BridgeWalk for Peace, coordinated by **Rev. David W. Brown**, drew hundreds, including **Mayor Michael Nutter**, to Franklin Square Park at 6th & Arch Streets on Friday, April 4, 2008, to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of the assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Memphis, TN.



Numerous speakers of all ages and ethnic backgrounds talked about their experiences in working with Dr. King or how Dr. King's work in civil and human rights had significantly changed their

lives. Among the speakers were former **Senator Harris Wofford**, a founder of the Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, **Rev. Ellis Washington**,

President of the Philadelphia Black Clergy, **Rev. Msgr. Federico A Britto**, pastor of St. Cyprian Catholic Church, **David Fair**, Vice President for Community Impact at United Way of Southeastern Pennsylvania and **William Tucker** of the Philadelphia Martin Luther King Jr. Association for Non-Violent Change.

Then, in the shadow of the Benjamin Franklin Bridge, the participants

were escorted around the fountain in Franklin Square Park and in place at 7:01 PM (the time that Dr. King was assassinated), where they linked arms, formed a human chain, and stood silent for 40 seconds (one second for each



year of the anniversary) in honor of Dr. King and the ongoing need to connect to each other and work toward peace throughout the world. At the end of the 40 seconds, Mayor Nutter recalled being a child at his grandmother's house when Dr. King was shot and understanding that something terrible had happened. He stated that while there has been progress, much more work is required of everyone to achieve the Beloved Community for which Dr. King worked and died.



Rev. Rookard, Carol Black, Tremain Smith, Sharon Brown and Lauren Brown also participated in this historic event. The BridgeWalk was supported by the Delaware River Port Authority, the City of Philadelphia, Franklin Square Park and KYW Newsradio.

Camphor Participates in Historic Philly CleanUp



If anyone drove by Shepard Recreation Center at 57th and Haverford Avenue on Saturday morning, April 5, 2008, they would have been delighted to see over 75 men, women and teens with rakes, brooms, and trashbags cleaning up the grounds on the first-ever Philly CleanUp Day organized by Mayor Nutter. Those from Camphor at the Shepard site were

Carol Black, Rev. Rookard and Raymel and Jesse Rookard.

Most impressive was a group of senior citizens who came from the suburbs to help with the effort. Carol Black, while working with a crew of teens, stopped to talk with reporters from the Philadelphia Inquirer and Main Line Times who wanted to know more about the neighborhood, the boundaries of Haddington and the demographics of the neighborhood.

Then with retiree, **Dr. Dean Snyder**, the crew began to clean a filthy alley behind the rowhouses on Haverford Avenue next to the recreation center. However, it wasn't until expert volunteers, **Carol** "CJ" Johnson and LaQuasha

Morrison, joined them that real progress was made. Found in the alley were



rusted auto parts, paint cans, cement buckets and mounds of beer bottles, broken glass, paper wrappers, plastic containers, weeds and

even a handbag with identification that appeared to have been stolen and thrown in the alley. Also observed was a frail dog that appeared to have been left in the yard of an abandoned house.



Over 100 large bags of trash were picked up by the City sanitation trucks from the front of Shepard.

Camphor was also well-represented in South Philadelphia. **Kyndal Goldsberry** was the site coordinator for Wordsworth Academy Beacon Center at 16th and Wharton Streets and the

Barratt Middle School. In that capacity she was in charge of 70 persons, including 30 children and 15 teens, who she equipped and dispersed to clean various sites in the neighborhood. She was also the point person for the block captains in that area. Joining her in the cleanup were **Phyllis Goldsberry, Christopher Chase** and daughter, **Kiera. Terry Trusty Jones** and her son, **Nathan**, participated in a cleanup with Wynnefield Neighbors Association.

After the cleanup, everyone enjoyed a free barbeque and entertainment at Lincoln Financial Field hosted by the **Philadelphia Eagles**. **Mayor Michael Nutter** was ecstatic as he congratulated everyone at the stadium for the largest volunteer cleanup effort in the city's history.
